- Strengthening the youth dimension of the EU neighbouring policy with Southern Mediterranean countries.





2018-2020 Impact – perceived improvements

- **85%** satisfaction among young people, **99%** among facilitation trainees
- **91%** active listening skills
- **89%** ability to work in a culturally diverse place
- 86% improved knowledge of global events
- 84% critical thinking
- **79%** English and/or foreign language skills
- **73%** improved their digital competencies
- **73%** built meaningful relationships with peers from other countries/regions

Different models of virtual exchange for HE

- 'ready made', facilitator-led, dialogue-based exchanges
 - Administered by NGOs
 - High quality satisfaction of participants
 - Can cater to large numbers of participants from diverse contexts
 - Powerful impact on attitudes towards others and transversal skills
 - Retention may be challenge; not flexible to needs, groups, languages; cost
- 'grassroots', co-designed exchanges (COIL, blended, pre-mobility)
 - Designed and led by educators
 - small-scale, flexible,
 - build competence of educators and strengthen partnerships
 - Cater to specific needs, subjects, target groups, languages
 - Quality can be variable, takes time to scale-up, difficulty engaging educators


